#### PLANNING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATIONS/PETITIONS

Planning Commission Chairman Mike Ready gave an update regarding the Development request from property owner Gina Ruggeri located at 201 Williams Street for the addition of a 400 square foot garage to the east side of the property attached to the house. The Planning Commission had instructed Ms. Ruggeri that a survey would be needed to clearly determine the setbacks. Ms. Ruggeri provided a survey prepared by Jordan Engineering depicting the required setbacks with a 30 ft. build to line on the Williams Street side and a 10 ft. build to line on the Asbury Street side. Based on these findings the Chair of the Planning Commission approved the Development request.

#### **CITIZENS COMMENTS/CONCERNS**

Mr. Michael Besaw – Mr. Besaw presented a letter to Council for the purpose of the possibility of him purchasing a parcel of city property adjacent and behind his property at 1020 Emory Street. Mr. Besaw stated this parcel would allow him driving access to the front of his house to allow a handicap access to the front door so certain members of his family can enter with ease and without trouble. #### **Mayor's Reports**

Mayor Roseberry made the following announcements and Reminders:

- 1. ARBOR DAY IN OXFORD The Arbor Day celebration on Saturday February 21st was excellent by any measure. We owe special thanks to the Tree Board leaders and volunteers. This is Oxford's 17th year as a Tree City. It was a joint celebration with Oxford College which was awarded its first Tree Campus designation.
- 2. CITY AND COLLEGE MEETING The mayor and council will meet with Oxford College Dean Stephen Bowen, Myra Frady and other college representatives on March 5<sup>th</sup> at 10:00 am in the community room. The college will present an update on construction and newly acquired property. All council members are invited to participate in the meeting. The meeting is open to the public.
- 3. ECG & MEAG Solar Initiative If you registered for the ECG MEAG Solar Initiative meeting (deadline was 2/27/15), it is scheduled for March 9, 2015 at the MEAG Training Center, 148 Powerhouse Road, Forsyth, Georgia. There will be a presentation on the possible impact of recent state legislation on MEAG cities.
- 4. ENVIRONMENTAL PLANNING: Opportunities and Financing Available NEGRC will host an educational workshop on environmental planning at their offices in Athens from 10:00 am until noon on March 24<sup>th</sup>. Registration deadline is March 19<sup>th</sup>. RSVP to jball@negrc.org or 706-369-5650.
- 5. NEWTON COUNTY TOMORROW Newton County Tomorrow (NCT) held its first meeting since re-organization and expanded the Board of Directors to include the mayors of the five cities in Newton County. The Board now consists of nine elected or appointed officials and eleven citizens as at-large members.
- 6. OPEN MEETINGS REMINDER Attorney General Sam Olens has issued open meetings guidelines for public officials. Briefly, council members may not discuss the public's business in private meetings (with some exceptions), including those conducted by electronic means. Any citizen has standing to complain directly to the Attorney General's office. Civil penalties start at \$1,000 for the first offense. Criminal penalties may also apply. The city attorney will speak to this briefly tonight and if council wishes he will speak in greater detail at a future work session. Attachment G

Mayor Roseberry asked City Attorney David Strickland to give a brief summary of these new guidelines. Attorney Strickland said it's all about interpretation whether the discussion is in a meeting or electronically. He advised council they should take caution in predetermining a vote prior to a meeting. It would be best to reserve any comments in relation to a vote for the official meeting. Members can meet to discuss as long as there is no quorum.

<u>Charge for Sewer Availability</u> - City Manager Bob Schwartz presented a first reading of an ordinance by The City Council of the City of Oxford to Amend Chapter 36 Utilities, Article IV sewer service, by adding section 36-93 paragraph (h) minimum sewer charge if unconnected; to repeal all conflicting ordinances; to provide for severability, an effective date; and for other purposes. City Entrance Signs — Councilmember Terry Smith presented on behalf of the ad-hoc sign committee members Ms. Sarah Davis, Ms. Judy Greer, and himself. The goal was to create a recommendation to the Council for city limit signs. The guiding principle was to create signage that is simple and consistent, while at the same time reflective of Oxford's historic nature. Considerations were given to simplicity, aesthetically pleasing, focus on city, cost (initial cost as well as the cost of maintenance and/or replacement), warranty, ease of installation, rights-of-way issues such as easement or acquisition of property, DOT requirements, including safety and placement and consistency. Mr. Smith stated we have (9) nine locations in the city which need signage. Five (5) of these signs would be for Emory Street North and South, Old Oxford Road, East Soule Street and Moore Street these signs would be 24" x 36" hanging from the arm on a 4" x 4" black metal post. The other four (4) signs would be for East Richardson, West Richardson, Haygood and Stone Streets. These signs would be an 18" x 24" sign mounted on a 4" x 4" black metal post. The material is metal with a poly foam coating as presented to you tonight. For the wordage we focused on Oxford. We wanted people to know they are in Oxford and it was founded in 1839. The maximum cost of all (9) nine signs will be less than \$6,000. After discussion: Attachment I

A motion was made by Smith, seconded by Windham to approve the (9) signs as described from our current vendor Printability with a maximum cost of \$6,000. The vote was 7 in favor with 0 opposed. The motion was approved. After further discussion a motion was made by Eady, seconded by Smith to amend the original motion to hold off and change the wording on the signs to read Chartered 1839 rather than Established 1839 and to allow the committee time to come back with color samples before making a final decision. The vote was 7 in favor with 0 opposed. The motion was approved.

Management of Undeveloped Land Owned by the City — City Attorney David Strickland presented a draft license agreement for the use of city property for Jeffrey and Janice Wearing as it relates to the use of a portion of the unopened rights-of-way of Coke Street and George Street. After discussion:

A motion was made by Holt, seconded by Windham to table this item for further discussion at the March 16, 2015 work session. The vote was 7 in favor with 0 opposed. The motion was approved. Attachment J

City Attorney David Strickland informed council of his negotiations with Mr. Andrew Byrd, property owner of 104 Watson Street – Tax Map and Parcel No. (X0120-00000-004-000). Mr. Byrd has accepted the proposal of \$67,000 for the purchase of his property. Strickland presented a contract and said if council is in agreement with this proposal he will execute the contract for the purchase. After further discussion council asked Attorney Strickland to continue with this purchase.

A motion was made by Windham, seconded by Eady to authorize City Attorney Strickland to proceed with the purchase of the property at 104 Watson Street – Tax Map and Parcel No.(X0120-00000-004-000) at the cost of \$67,000. The vote was 7 in favor, 0 opposed. The motion was approved.

<u>Financials</u> - Mayor Roseberry informed council that as of January 31, 2015 the General Fund Operating account has an excess of \$1,212,976. He informed council that in past it was the practice of the finance committee to only keep \$600,000 to \$700,000 in the operating checking account. After discussion Mayor Roseberry requested

a motion to authorize the City Clerk to move \$500,000 from the checking account at United Bank and move it into a 12 month CD at BB&T.

A motion was made by Smith, seconded by Holt to authorize the City Clerk to move \$500,000 from the United Bank checking account to a 12 month CD at BB & T. The vote was 7 in favor, 0 opposed. The motion was approved.

A motion was made by Windham, seconded by Smith to adjourn the regular session at 8:47 pm. The vote was 7 in favor, 0 opposed. The motion was approved.

### OXFORD PLANNING COMMISSION

Minutes – December 9, 2014

**MEMBERS**: Mike Ready, Chair; Jonathan Eady, Vice-Chair, Penny England, Vivian Harris, and Ron Manson. Shawn Gaither was absent.

STAFF: Bob Schwartz, city manager and zoning administrator.

**GUESTS**: Kendra Mayfield, Marguerite Abd El-Shahid, and James Johnson with Oxford College; and Debbie Fritz, architect with Lord, Aeck, and Sargent.

**OPENING**: Mr. Ready called the meeting to order and welcomed the guests.

**APPROVAL OF MINUTES:** Upon motion of Mr. Eady, seconded by Ms. Harris, the minutes for the meeting of November 11, 2014 were approved.

**OXFORD COLLEGE DINING HALL SETBACK VARIANCE REQUESTS** – Oxford College has submitted two variance requests to accommodate the construction of a new dining hall. The property is at 801 Asbury. It is bounded by Asbury, Pierce, and Wesley with private property to the north.

Mr. Ready wanted to let the representatives of Oxford College know that the right-of-way for Asbury as shown on their drawings is not straight. That is, it bends halfway through their property. Based on the way the City of Oxford was laid out that is incorrect. The right-of-way should be a straight line. There followed a discussion between Mr. Eady and representatives of the college about the deeds for the property and the correct right-of-way line. Finally, it was noted by Mr. Ready that the college needed to be absolutely sure of the right-of-way line before starting construction. This would not affect the discussion of a variance of the setback requirements.

Ms. Abd El-Shahid reviewed the schematic drawing with the Planning Commission. Miss Fritz reviewed several of the other exhibits and then the two letters which she had prepared requesting the two variances. She noted that the property in question is wedge-shaped and trapezoidal and therefore is hard to build on. She reported that other buildings and houses along Wesley and Asbury are also very close to the right-of-way line.

Ms. Mayfield reported that the programming required by the new dining hall will take every inch available on this lot. Mr. Eady questioned whether or not a one foot setback would work. Miss Abd El-Shahid stated that they may not use all of the property up to the build to line, but they are trying to be realistic by requesting a zero setback to give them flexibility in the final design of the building. There was further discussion of the location of the loading dock and how delivery trucks would access the new dining hall.

Upon motion of Mr. Manson, seconded by Ms. Harris, the Planning Commission approved a zero setback on Asbury for recommendation to City Council for a variance. All members voted in favor.

Mr. Manson and Mr. Eady had a short discussion about the request on Wesley.

Upon motion of Mr. Manson, seconded by Ms. Harris, the Planning Commission approved a zero setback on Wesley for recommendation to City Council for a variance. All members voted in favor.

**OXFORD COLLEGE SIGN REQUESTS** - Oxford College submitted requests for three signs. These include a single-sided sign on Wesley Circle behind the current dining hall, a double-sided sign on Wesley Street at Wesley Circle pointing toward the current dining hall and a double-sided sign on Wesley in front of the current dining hall. The Planning Commission had reviewed the requests in advance based on the written submittal from the College.

Upon motion of Mr. Manson, seconded by Ms. England, all three signs were approved as requested. All members voted in favor.

**OXFORD COLLEGE FUTURE DEVELOPMENT PLAN AMENDMENTS**: Oxford College requests the approval of several amendments to the future development plan. Mr. Ready noted that this request was discussed on a preliminary basis during the Planning Commission meeting on November 11<sup>th</sup>. The proposed amendments are:

- 4a Existing and Proposed Land Use
  - 4. Proposed Future Campus Life Center
  - 5. Proposed Future Campus Life Addition of approximately 10,000 square feet.
  - 31. Proposed Dining Hall approximately 20,600 square feet.
- 4c. Existing and proposed vehicular circulation patterns, including deliveries
  - West Moore Street will be the primary Campus entrance for delivery traffic. The delivery traffic will then turn right onto the service road to the west of Campus.
  - 2. Pierce Street will be the primary Campus entrance for vehicular traffic.
  - 3. Pierce Street will be the entrance for new dining delivery vehicles only.
- 4d. Existing and proposed pedestrian circulation patterns
  - Proposed Hamill Street closure to vehicular traffic to become a pedestrian corridor with a pedestrian cross walk to the east across Highway 81.

 Pedestrian traffic will approach new dining facility crossing Pierce Street at Asbury Street and Wesley Street and will cross Wesley Street at Pierce Street.

Mr. Johnson reviewed the changes in the list of amendments. The big changes are the addition of a new dining hall and the closing of Hamill Street. Ms. Mayfield discussed the other changes. Mr. Manson asked whether there was any timetable for the closing of Hamill and what would be the treatment of the closed street; that is, what would it look like? Ms. Mayfield said that the college was planning to propose a project to close Hamill and would be more specific at a later date. After further discussion, Mr. Ready recommended that the College take the closing of Hamill Street out of this list of amendments. We could return to that issue in a later time. The representatives of Oxford College agreed to that request.

Upon motion of Mr. Manson, seconded by Mr. Eady the list of proposed amendments to the future development plan were approved for recommendation to City Council, with the exception of 4d 1., which refers to Hamill Street. All members voted in favor.

**ADJOURNMENT**: Mr. Ready reminded everyone that we are required to have an organizational meeting in January. He then wished everyone "Happy Holidays" and adjourned the meeting at 8:31 PM.

The parcel is only 136' X 105', 14,820 square feet. (The width of my property 136', and only 105' back)







Any citizen has standing to complain directly to the Attorney General's office. Civil penalties start at \$1,000 for the first offense. Criminal penalties may also apply. AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF OXFORD TO AMEND CHAPTER 36 UTILITIES, ARTICLE IV SEWER SERVICE, BY ADDING SECTION 36-93 PARAGRAPH (H) MINIMUM SEWER CHARGE IF UNCONNECTED; TO REPEAL ALL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; TO PROVIDE FOR SEVERABILITY, AN EFFECTIVE DATE; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

WHEREAS, the City pursuant to O.C.G.A. Sec. 36-35-3 known as the "Home Rule for Municipalities", is authorized under paragraph (a) of the rule to adopt clearly reasonable ordinances, resolutions or regulations related to its property, affairs, and local government for which no provision has been made by general law and which are not inconsistent with the Constitution or any charter provision applicable thereto; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the City deem it in the best interest of the government and the residents of the City, and further as a matter of public safety, to establish a minimum sewer fee for those owners whose properties lie within the City, and which are required to be connected to public sewer, but who have failed to timely complete the connection; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the City of Oxford have determined that the proper means of addressing said concern is to amend Chapter 36: Utilities; Article IV: Sewer Service: Section 36-93: Use of Public Sewers Required; and

**NOW THEREFORE**, be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of Oxford that Chapter 36: Article IV: Section 36-93 be amended by adding paragraph (h), as follows:

(Additions are in *underlined bold italics*)

Section 1.

Section 36-93 Use of public sewers required.

(h) Minimum sewer charge if unconnected. Any owner of a property situated within 100 feet of rights-of-way containing public sewer, who has been timely notified of the requirement to connect to the public sewer line as required by paragraph (e), and who has not done so, shall be

charged the minimum sewer charge each month until the required connection is properly made. This charge shall begin at the conclusion of any associated judicial proceedings, and shall be included within the City's utility bill and shall be in addition to any judicial penalties incurred for failing to comply with the requirements of paragraph (e).

### Section 2. Repeal of All Ordinances in Conflict

All ordinances and resolutions or portions thereof in conflict with this ordinance are repealed to the extent of their conflict.

### Section 3. Severability

If any section, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance, and such remainder shall remain in full force and effect.

#### Section 4. Effective Date

Pursuant to Sec. 2-21 (9) (D), this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect five (5) days after its final passage.

First reading, this 2<sup>nd</sup> day of March 2015.

Second reading and adoption, this 6<sup>th</sup> day of April 2015.







City desires to issue a License to Wearing (a portion of which shall be reserved for the exclusive use of Wearing, and a portion of which shall be non-exclusive to Wearing) for the use of a portion of the unopened right-of-ways of Coke Street and George Street, within the City of Oxford, Georgia, as designated by City, during the Term, as herein defined, for the following purposes only: to maintain the current approved passive uses as a pond, green space and extended yard area contiguous to Wearing's residence. (the "Uses"). The licensed area is further and more particularly described in Exhibit "A", attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the sum of Ten (\$10.00) Dollars and other good and valuable considerations, the receipt and sufficiency of which are herewith acknowledged, the parties hereto intending to be legally bound, hereby agree as follows:
  - 1. Grant of License. City hereby grants to Wearing the license to the Licensed Area for the Uses, provided that such Uses by Wearing shall not interfere with the use and enjoyment by City of any of City's other property or disturb the state of City's other property. The license shall be exclusive to Wearing for the portion of Licensed Area identified on the attached plat as "pond" and all portions of the Coke Street Right-of-Way north of said pond, within the Licensed Area; the balance of the Licensed Area within the George Street Right-of-Way, not inclusive of the pond area shall be non-exclusively available for Wearing's use. Any other use of the Licensed Area by Wearing is expressly prohibited.
  - 2. <u>Security Deposit.</u> \$\_\_\_\_\_.00 to be returned to Wearing so long as Wearing faithfully performs all obligations hereunder.

- 3. Term. The term of the License shall be from \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, 2015 through \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, 2015, midnight prevailing local time, (the "Term"), subject to City's right to terminate the license granted herein upon a Default, or for Convenience, as herein defined.
- 4. Payments by Wearing. As consideration for the rights and license granted herein, Wearing shall pay to City \$\_\_\_\_\_\_.00 annually for the Term, payable in advance, by January 1 of each year.
- 5. Wearing's Covenants. Wearing hereby covenants and agrees as follows:
  - a. Wearing's use and exercise of this license shall comply with all applicable ordinances, laws and regulations of the City of Oxford and Newton County and all other applicable governmental authorities.
  - b. Except as expressly approved by City, Wearing shall not and shall have no right to construct temporary or other improvements at or about the Space, nor on any property under City's control without the prior, express written consent and approval of specific plans by City.
  - c. Wearing shall comply with all rules and regulations promulgated by City relating to the Space and the Property, from time to time.
- 6. <u>Insurance</u>. At all times during the Term, Wearing, at its sole cost and expense, shall keep, maintain and cause to be written a policy or policies of insurance with companies authorized to do business in the State of Georgia, insuring Wearing and City, as hereinafter defined, against any and all insurable liability in the form generally known as Home/Landowners and Property Damage insurance, including claims and demands made by any person or persons whomsoever for injuries received or property damaged in connection with the operation and maintenance of the Space and for any other risk insured by such policies, on an occurrence basis, with combined single limits of not less than \$1 Million. Evidence of such insurance satisfactory to City shall be delivered to City prior to the commencement of the Term, together with adequate evidence of the fact that premiums for such insurance have been paid. Such policies shall contain a provision that said policies shall not be canceled or terminated during the term hereof.
- 7. <u>Default by Wearing</u>. Upon Wearing's failure to perform, fulfill or observe any term or covenant contained in this license to be performed, fulfilled or observed by Wearing, or in situations involving potential danger to the health or safety of persons in, on or about the Property, the same shall be deemed a "default". Upon such event, City may, at its election, revoke and terminate this license and all rights and privileges granted herein, and exercise all rights and remedies available at law or in equity, including injunctive relief against the continued occupancy of the Space or Property by Wearing upon application to a court of competent jurisdiction, without requirement for posting of bond

or security. Upon such termination, Wearing will vacate the Licensed Area within thirty (30) days of notice and surrender Licensed Area to City.

- 8. <u>Termination for Convenience by City</u>. City may also, at its election, choose to revoke and terminate this license and all rights and privileges granted herein, at its convenience, with or without cause. Upon such termination, Wearing will vacate the Licensed Area within thirty (30) days of notice and surrender the Licensed Area.
- 9. Wearing's Indemnity. Wearing hereby indemnifies and holds City harmless from and against any and all claims, actions, damages, liabilities, and expenses resulting from or connected with any loss of life, personal injury and/or damage to personal or real property, arising from or out of the occupancy or use by Wearing of the Licensed Area or any part thereof or occasioned wholly or in part by any act or omission of Wearing, its officers, agents, contractors or employees, sub-licensees, and invitees. Wearing further indemnifies, releases from liability and holds City harmless from damages, abatement of rental, or otherwise, or any damage sustained by Wearing or any other person due to the Licensed Area, or part thereof or any appurtenances thereto becoming out of repair, or due to the happening of any accident, including, but not limited to, any damage caused by water, snow, windstorm, tornado and from any acts or omissions of Wearing. The foregoing to the contrary notwithstanding, in no event shall Wearing be required to indemnify City against Wearing resulting from affirmative acts or proven negligences solely on the part of City, and their respective its agents, contractors, or employees.
- 10. No Easement Created. City and Wearing intend that no easement be created by this license, notwithstanding that Wearing may incur expenses in connection with this license.
- 11. <u>Notices</u>. Any and all notices, demands, requests and responses thereto permitted or required to be given under this license shall be in writing, signed by or on behalf of the party giving such notice, and shall be delivered to the other party at the address of such other party set forth below:

(c) Wearing shall not have the right to assign or sublet Wearing's rights under this license. (d) Time is of the essence of this license. (e) This license shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Georgia and shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the parties hereto and their respective legal representatives. (f) The parties each represent that no real estate agent or broker has any interest in this license.
